TWO EXCEPTIONAL PROGRAMS OFFERED IN FLORIDA

The Florida Master Gardener Volunteer

We have two programs in Florida about which most of us are aware, but we have many new members who might want to avail themselves of these programs. The Florida Master Gardener Volunteer Program is an outreach program provided by the UF/IFAS Extension through which certified volunteers provide research-based horticultural education to Florida residents. Topics include (but are not limited to) horticulture, urban forestry, Florida friendly gardening, botany, fruit crops, lawns, plant diseases and environmental science.

Participants in the program must complete a 50-hour plus training course involving lectures, labs and field training. After certification, Master Gardeners must work through their county Extension office to contribute 75 hours volunteer hours and 10 learning hours within the first year of certification. Certified Master Gardeners can earn these volunteer hours answering gardening questions from local residents, participating in community and school garden projects, supporting youth activities and more. In other words..... participating in a lot of our endeavors!

We have five Master Gardeners in our Club - Luanne Betz, Nancy DaSilva, Jill Kareff, Pilar Londono and Caroline Steffen. All value the knowledge they had gained, particularly since it was science based, and the gratification of giving back to the community.

The 2023 class starts in July and registration must take place prior to June 4. The cost is \$275 for inscription in the course, with an additional good-faith volunteer deposit of \$200. The \$200 good - faith deposit is refundable if the trainee completes his/her 75 volunteer hours completed within one calendar year from the final examination. This is a simplified version of the volunteer requirements which you must investigate in their entirety.

The Florida Master Naturalist Program

The Florida Master Naturalist Program (FMNP) is an adult education program developed by the University of Florida and provided by participating organizations. Their mission is to promote awareness, understanding, and respect of Florida's natural world among Florida's citizens and visitors. FMNP Instructors teach participants about Florida's environment using science-based information and interpretive techniques that prepare participants to share their knowledge with others.

The FMNP has three core courses— Freshwater Systems, Coastal Systems and Upland Systems. Each core course provides 40 contact hours of classroom learning, field trips, and practical experience. The registration fee per core module is \$245 - \$295 and includes a detailed course manual and, upon completion, FMNP patch, certificate and pin denoting area of expertise, FMNP nametag (if not previously received) and entry into the on-line FMNP Graduate Database.

Graduates who complete all three core courses will become certified Florida Master Naturalists and will receive a Master Naturalist pin, and registration in the online Master Naturalist Honor Roll Database.

The FMNP also offers four Land Steward courses, designed to provide more detailed information and/or hands-on skills in specific subject areas and they are starting a new program of Restoration Courses.

What to Plant in January

Annuals: Begonia, Lobelia, Dianthus, Dusty Miller, Nicotiana, Petunia, Snapdragon, Zinnia, Coleus [Gardening with Annuals in Florida](#)

Bulbs: Agapanthus, Clivia lily, Crinum [Bulbs for Florida](#)

Herbs: Dill, Fennel, Tarragon, Thyme, anything in the mint family [Herbs in the Florida Garden](#)

Shrubs and Trees: Most can be planted year-round [Florida Friendly Landscaping](#)

Vegetables: Beets, Broccoli, Cabbage, Lettuce, Turnip [Florida Vegetable Gardening Guide](#)

What to do in January

Soil: cool weather = ideal time to amend soil [Your Florida Soil](#)

Landscaping: It is a good time to plant woody shrubs. Remember Right Plant/Right Place and match the mature size with the location. Water frequently to get new plantings off to a good start. **See** *The Florida-Friendly Landscaping™ Guide to Plant Selection and Landscape Design*

Trees: Prepare for hurricane season now by checking trees for damaged or weak branches and pruning if needed. Hire an ISA-certified arborist

Irrigation: Water plants if temperatures remain higher than normal and rainfall is scarce

Shrubs and trees: Prune non-spring flowering shrubs and trees this month to improve form.

Cold protection: Bring sensitive plants like orchids inside if a **frost** or **freeze** is predicted. Thoroughly water and cover sensitive plants in the landscape 12–24 hours before a **freeze**. **See** *Cold Protection and Chilling Damage of Landscape Plants*: https://edis.ifas.ufl.edu/topic_landscapes_and_cold

Pests: Apply horticultural oil to citrus, shrubs, and deciduous fruit trees while plants are dormant to control scale. Apply copper spray to mangoes after bloom. **See** *Landscape Pest Management*: https://edis.ifas.ufl.edu/topic_landscape_pests

PLANT OF THE MONTH

FLORIDA NATIVE PLANT

Wild Coffee

Wild coffee is a native shrub that makes a versatile addition to the landscape. The evergreen leaves are shiny and dark green. Clusters of small white flowers bloom from the branch tips in spring and summer, and red fruits are produced in summer and fall. The fruits resemble true coffee beans, but do not contain caffeine—while wild coffee is in the same family (*Rubiaceae*) as true coffee, *Coffea* spp., they are not the same species.

These shrubs reach 4 to 10 feet tall and spread 4 to 8 feet wide with a dense, rounded growth habit. When grown in heavy shade, the form may be more like a small tree with an open canopy. Cultivars of wild coffee, such as the dwarf shrub 'Little Psycho'[™] can be found in the plant trade.

These plants do well when grown in partial to full shade; leaves become yellowed and the plant will stay small if grown in an area with full sun.

Birds and other wildlife are attracted to wild coffee fruits, while the flowers are one of the nectar sources for the rare Atala butterfly found primarily in southeast Florida.



DID YOU KNOW...



Butterflies can actually taste with their tiny feet, as that's where their sensors are.



If holly finds its leaves are being nibbled by deer, it switches genes on to make them spiky when they regrow? So on taller holly trees, the upper leaves (which are out of reach) have smooth edges, while the lower leaves are prickly. Cool info and photo from u/dirtybird971 on Reddit.



Brazilian Grape Tree (also known as Jaboticaba) does not use branches to grow fruits. It grows fruits (and flowers) directly on the trunk!

Likin' these photos, but wondering what you're seeing? Today we're shining the spotlight on **lichens**, another (surprise!) somewhat tough to classify forest find. These crusty and complex creations aren't plants, or animals, or even totally a fungus – each one is actually a symbiotic partnership between a fungus and an alga or cyanobacteria.

Because of the diverse combination possibilities among these organisms, there are at least 3,600 species of **lichens** known in North America, and over 800 in NY alone!

*Like our native clubmosses, **lichens** have been around for ages – 300+ million years, to be non-exact. Because they are often seen on dead or dying trees, they sometimes mistakenly get a bad rep. However, this association is only because **lichens** need a lot of light (which is plentiful on a tree without leaves). In fact, **lichens** are totally harmless to the trees they grow on. So next time you notice one, if you're ~lichen~ what you're seeing, be sure to respect this forest elder by appreciating its unique beauty and maybe snapping a pic or two.*

Areas covered are Coral Springs, Parkland, Tamarac, Coconut Creek, and Margate.

Anyone can nominate a yard to the club, even yourself. This nomination is sent to gardenclubs2020@yahoo.com.

No patios or condos are considered.

Pictures of said nominations are sent for approval and a google earth search is completed by Jeri.

Jeri will send photos of the nominations to the committee, but everyone wins unless the yard is not suitable.

After the nominations are approved, Ken or Jeri will call and set up an appointment around the 15th of every month.

Emails are then sent to the committee for presentation of the sign with a date, time and addresses of the winners. The home is then visited by the committee and/or other club members and the sign is presented along with a laminated certificate.

Mary Anne makes up the certificate and there are 4 signs.
