For weekend getaways, there are several hidden gems to explore in our own South Florida:

Deerfield Island Park is one such adventure. Weekend shuttle cruises from the mainland will take you on a brief journey. Marked trails enable the visitor access to possible sightings of mangrove bird species, gopher tortoises and native flora of South Florida.





Another intriguing spot is in Wilton Manors. The Alchemist provides a garden setting, tacos, and along the garden path antiques are offered. Lola's Market is an eclectic assortment of trinkets and whatnots. Behind Lola's is a mural and wonderful garden spot.

At the end of Atlantic Boulevard in Coral Springs is the Atlantic Trailhead. Visitors have an unobstructed view of our magnificent sunsets. The Conservation Levee Trail leads deep into solitude and a peaceful atmosphere.





Miramar is home to Snake Warrior's Island Natural Area, which is the oldest eastern Glades settlement of the Seminoles. Annuals/Bedding plants: Create a display of fall colors with cool-season plants. Some examples include strawflower, cape daisy, and pansy. See Annuals: https://edis.ifas.ufl.edu/topic annual landscape plants

<u>Bulbs</u>: Many bulbs like to get their start in cool weather. Bulbs to plant this month include amaryllis, crinum, and the many varieties of elephant's ear. See *Bulbs for Florida*: https://edis.ifas.ufl.edu/topic_bulbous_flowers

<u>Herbs:</u> Continue planting herbs from seeds or plants. A wide variety of herbs like cooler, dryer weather, including cilantro, dill, fennel, parsley, sage, and thyme. See <u>Herbs: https://edis.ifas.ufl.edu/topic_herbs</u>

<u>Vegetables:</u> Lots of choices exist for November including beans, broccoli, kale, snow/English peas, and strawberries. See *Vegetable Gardening in Florida*: https://edis.ifas.ufl.edu/topic_vegetable_gardening



WHAT TO DO

<u>Perennials:</u> Divide and replant overgrown perennials and bulbs now so that they establish before the coolest weather arrives. **See** Seeds and Propagation (Lawn and Garden): https://edis.ifas.ufl.edu/ topic garden propagation

Lawns: Watch for brown patch and large patch until May. These fungal diseases cause areas of grass to turn brown. Since treatment is difficult, prevention with proper cultural practices is key. **See** *Turf Diseases*: https://edis.ifas.ufl.edu/topic_turf_diseases

Scale insects: Take advantage of lower temperatures to apply horticultural oil sprays to control scale insects. **See** *Landscape Pest Management*: https://edis.ifas.ufl.edu/topic landscape pests

<u>Irrigation:</u> Turn off systems and water only if needed. Plants need less supplemental watering in cooler weather. See *Landscape Irrigation*: https://edis.ifas.ufl.edu/topic_landscape_irrigation

<u>Poinsettias</u>: Watch for hornworms on poinsettias planted in the landscape. This pest can quickly defoliate a plant. Handpick or treat only the infested area. See *Poinsettias*: https://edis.ifas.ufl.edu/topic poinsettia

PLANT OF THE MONTH

Coontie



<u>Coontie</u> is Florida's only **native cycad**. It resembles a small palm and offers a lush tropical look. <u>Coonties</u> are drought resistant, easy to maintain, and are relatively salt tolerant.

<u>Coonties</u> are also the host plant for the rare **Atala** butterfly caterpillar.

<u>Coontie</u> will grow to be about three feet in height. It can grow in full sun to full shade, and it does not need much water to grow.



Simmering Potpourri for Fall



To make 2 jars of fall simmering potpourri

- 2 apples
- 2 oranges
- 2 tablespoons of whole cloves
- 1 tablespoon of ground nutmeg
- 8 sticks of cinnamon



Fall Stovetop Potpourri Directions

Slice the apples and oranges into 1/4 inch slices. Place 1 apple sliced, 1 orange sliced, 4 cinnamon sticks, and 1 tablespoon cloves to each 32 ounce mason jar.

To make this homemade fall potpourri on the stove, place the contents of one jar, 2 cups of water, and 2 tablespoons of vanilla extract in a large saucepan. Heat over high heat until boiling. Then reduce the heat and let it simmer.

You can store leftover wet potpourri in a quart mason jar and reuse it for up to 4 days.

Once it has water in it or you use fresh fruit, it must be refrigerated when not in use.

How to take Rex Begonia Leaf Cuttings

Gardeners' World Magazine

Cut a young, clean, healthy leaf right at the base. Cut off its stalk.



Make slashes along the underside of the main vein. Pin the whole leaf down onto firmed, moist compost.



Warmth and moisture will encourage growth at the damaged parts of the vein. Several young plants will form on each leaf.



Roots and new plants will develop from the vein at the base of each cutting. You can tease the pot of plantlets apart and grow them on separately or transplant them as a group to produce a bushier pot plant.
