Thank you to Casey Lee, the City Arborist of Coral Springs, for this article on the proper pruning and planting of trees. She is also a member of our Club!



Proper tree pruning is essential for the longevity of mature trees

Tree pruning, often referred to as "trimming" is the removal of dead, diseased, weak, or objectionable branches. Homeowners should have their trees properly pruned by a Tree Care Professional. The City of Coral Springs requires either a "Certified Arborist" or a "Broward County Licensed Tree Trimmer" to do the work. Be sure to ask the Tree Professional to show you their license and insurance before preforming any work or paying them.

The City has ordnances in place to protect trees and palms, so be sure that your trees are pruned properly and NOT "Hatracked", "Topped", or "Lion Tailed". Improper pruning will lead to a Code Compliance violation to the homeowner. If a tree needs to be removed, a "Tree Removal Permit" is required and can be found on the City of Coral Springs website, along with other landscape and tree maintenance guidelines at coralsprings.gov/trees.

"The best way to protect your landscape and home from hurricane damage is to select trees carefully at the time of installation, select native species of trees with strong root systems, trunks, and branches they will be more wind resistant. Additionally, mature trees should be properly pruned approximately every two years. Only remove dead fronds or fruit from palms, never remove green fronds as they are the food and energy source for the palm.

With either properly pruning or tree removal, be sure to have your tree professional include the price of tree debris removal as part of their service. You will need to arrange a special pick-up from Waste Profer the removal of yard waste. City residents may bring excess yard waste to the Waste Transfer Station at the west end of Wiles Road on select weekend days.

Proper planting of new tree

The City of Coral Springs landscape ordinances state that all newly planted trees and palms must be Florida #1 quality at time of planting. It is always recommended to plant either native species or species that can tolerate south Florida weather conditions. Trees should never be planted deep; in fact, they should be planted about 10% above the grade. Never make the planting hole deeper than the size of the root ball and the width should be 2 to 3 times the size of the root ball. Backfill the planting hole with some existing soil and imported soil. Trees and palms should be staked at time of planting to secure they grow straight and do not snap. Most stakes should never be left on for more than 6 months unless otherwise instructed. Water a newly installed plant for the first 30 days in the dry season and then monitor as needed. Mulch around the tree well about 12" wide and 3" deep, keep mulch off the trunk about 3" to prevent trunk rot.


Tree Removal Process


Residents of Coral Springs as well as all of Broward County must obtain a tree removal permit to remove any species of protected tree or palms. Residents can find the residential tree removal permit

application on the City of Coral Springs website or in person at the City Building Department. When applying for the permit, residents must submit the filled-out permit application, include a survey or sketch showing the location of the tree/palm on the yard, HOA approval, a picture of the tree, and any other valuable information that maybe helpful in explaining the reason for removal. Once the City has received the information, a site visit will be performed by the City Arborist to assure that the removal is the only possible way to solve the concerns. If the request does not warrant the approval of removal the City Arborist will advise of other methods to solve the residents' concerns.


Proper Pruning Principles






Hardwoods


Conifers







- Crown cleaning The selective removal of one or more of the following items: dead, dying or diseased branches, weak branches and watersprouts
- **Crown thinning** The selective removal of branches to increase light penetration, air movement and to reduce weight
- **Crown raising** The removal of the lower branches to provide clearance
- Crown reduction or shaping Decrease the height and/or spread of a tree. Consideration should be given to the ability of the species to sustain this type of pruning
- Vista pruning The selective thinning of framework limbs or specific areas of the crown to allow a view of an object from a predetermined spot
- Crown restoration Should improve the structure, form and appearance of trees which have been severely headed, vandalized or storm damaged.

Nominated by members. Awarded to a member who goes above and beyond.




This month's winner is:

Nominations are made by members. PLEASE review the following rules and keep this in mind as you drive around our area.

Yard of the Month guidelines were determined by Ken, Mary Anne, Carol J, Nancy D, Casey and Jeri.

Nominations for Yard of the Month are for the front and back yards.

Areas covered are Coral Springs, Parkland, Tamarac, Coconut Creek, and Margate.

Anyone can nominate a yard to the club, even yourself. This nomination is sent to gardenclubs2020@yahoo.com.

No patios or condos are considered.

Pictures of said nominations are sent for approval and a google earth search is completed by Jeri.

Jeri will send photos of the nominations to the committee, but everyone wins unless the yard is not suitable.

After the nominations are approved, Ken or Jeri will call and set up an appointment around the 15th of every month.

Emails are then sent to the committee for presentation of the sign with a date, time and addresses of the winners. The garden is then visited by the committee and/or other club members and the sign is presented along with a laminated certificate.

Mary Anne makes up the certificate and there are 4 signs.

Nancy photographs the yard during the visit and then a collage is made and put on Facebook. Photos from Facebook are then sent to Mary Anne and Dotty to be added to the newsletter. Yard of the Month winners will also be uploaded to the club's web site.
